>Please accept my condolences on your recent bereavement. I was priveleged >to have been a member of the Beatty staff during Mr. Ambiavagar's short >tenure as Principal of the school. He was a soft spoken man but with enough >steel in his voice to "intimidate" many of us recently graduated young >teachers then. We all feared the short note on a small piece of paper that >would be handed over by the office boy to any teacher, whom Mr. Ambiavagar >wanted to see. It contained only two words: "Please speak." He had also >absolute control over the whole school the quality of which not seen in >many other Principals. I recall an occasion when there was an impending >petrol strike. Fearing that we would run out of petrol we approached him >for permission to leave the school to go to the nearest petrol station in >the vicinity of Lavendar street. Several of us were given instant >permission to do so. When we came back later the whole school was QUIET, >even though several classes were without teachers. AND Mr. Ambiavagar was >in his office doing his paper work! We used to be in awe at his command of >the English language. Every staff meeting was an object lesson in English. >We used to look forward to his intricate sentence construction that most of >the time we would wonder how he was going to complete the sentence without >falling into the pitholes that a lesser person would have fallen into.
