MALACCA, Mon.—The Malacca Government has dropped 110,000 leaflets by air in the Jasin area calling on eight terrorists including two women to "come out and renew yourselves."

The leaflets pointed out that their comrade Phang Kong Yee, who ignored the Government's surrender terms, was killed by the security forces on Aug. 29.

"The same offer was made to you," it continued.

"You ignored it then. Will you ignore it now? Do not be foolish."

The association last month protested against the nine-month delay in the confirmation.

The three men promoted are: Mr. V. **Amblavagar**, principal of Beatty School to deputy secretary; Mr. Soo Ban Hoe, principal of Gan Eng Seng School, to senior inspector of English schools; and Mr. P.A.D'Costa, inspector of schools, to staff officer, Government Schools.

First batch

Mr. V. **Amblavagar**, 49, was one of the first batch of graduates of the former Raffles College in 1931, and took his first appointment with St. Andrew's School.

In 1953, he was acting principal of Raffles Institution and in 1955, principal of Beatty School.

Mr. Soo Ban Hoe, who has completed a course in visual and aural aids to education at London University, was one of the two Singapore representatives to the recent UNESCO conferences in Geneva.
